Why Apprenticeship? Let's review some facts...

More than 150,000 employers and labor management organizations benefit from apprenticeships.

There are 545,000+ apprentices nationwide in more than

1,000 occupations.

Nearly 9 out of 10 apprentices are employed after completing their apprenticeship. Average starting salary: \$60K+ per year.

Workers who complete apprenticeship programs earn \$300,000 more over a career than their peers who don't.

For every dollar spent on apprenticeship, employers get approximately \$1.50 ROI.

Apprentices earn while they learn, reducing their need to take on debt.

What Is An Apprenticeship?

Apprenticeships have been a proven employment and training strategy for many years.

The Basic Components Of An Apprenticeship Are:

- 1. Business involvement
- 2. Structured on-the-job training
- 3. Related Instruction
- 4. Rewards for skills gains
- 5. Nationally recognized Occupational Credential

Business Involvement

Employers are the foundation of every apprenticeship program. They play an active role in building the program and remain involved every step of the way. Employers sometimes work together to develop and maintain apprenticeship programs that are unique to their industry.



Structured On-The-Job Training

Employers develop an onthe-job training plan for apprentices using the identified skills sets of an occupation as a guide. Onthe-job training is provided through an experienced mentor.



Related Instruction

Apprenticeship programs include related instruction that supplements on-the-job learning and provides the technical and academic competencies that apply to the job. This instruction can be delivered by an education and training provider or by the business themselves.



Rewards For Skills Gains

Apprentices earn competitive wages- a paycheck from day one and incremental raises as skill levels increase.



National Occupational Credential

Every graduate of a Registered Apprenticeship program receives a nationally-recognized credential that certifies that the worker is fully qualified for that occupation.


