Estimated Federal Student Aid

Federal Pell Grant
A **Federal Pell Grant** is awarded to undergraduate students who have financial need and who have not earned a degree or are in a teacher certification program. Federal Pell Grants don't need to be repaid. Up to **\$7,395**

Federal Direct Loans
A **federal direct loan** is money lent by the government to you that you must repay with interest. Up to **\$5,500**

Federal Work-Study
Federal Work-Study is a way for students to earn money to pay for school through part-time jobs on or off campus. **You May Be Eligible**

Your Student Aid Index (SAI)


